A BILL ENTITLED

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AN ACT concerning
Primary and Secondary Education – Immunizations of Children Entering School
FOR the purpose of requiring the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, in cooperation with the State Board of Education and the Statewide Advisory Commission on Immunizations, to adopt regulations requiring that before a child enters a certain grade, the child has received a certain number of doses of human papillomavirus vaccine; and generally relating to immunizations required of children entering schools.
BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments, Article – Education Section 7–403 Annotated Code of Maryland (2014 Replacement Volume and 2015 Supplement)
SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND. That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
Article – Education
7–403.
(a) (1) In cooperation with the State Board and the Medical and Chirurgical Faculty of Maryland, the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene shall adopt rules and regulations regarding blood tests for lead poisoning required of children entering schools.
(2) In cooperation with the State Board and the Statewide Advisory Commission on Immunizations, the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene shall adopt rules and regulations regarding immunizations required of children entering schools.



- 1 (3) These rules and regulations shall:
 2 (i) Be adopted in compliance with the Administrative Procedure 3 Act;
- 4 (ii) Provide that any child may have the immunization administered 5 by his personal physician; [and]
- 6 (iii) By September 2003, in areas designated as at risk for lead 1. 7 poisoning, as determined under § 18–106 of the Health – General Article, when a child 8 enters a public prekindergarten program, kindergarten program, or first grade, require the 9 parent or legal guardian of the child to provide documentation from a health care provider. 10 on a form developed by the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, certifying that the 11 child has undergone blood testing for lead poisoning administered in accordance with the 12 guidelines of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in the screening of young 13 children for lead poisoning: Guidance for State and Local Public Health Officials (November 14 1997) and any subsequent guidelines; and
- By September 2003, require a program or school to report the name, last known address, and telephone number of each child for whom certified documentation of a lead test is not provided under item 1 of this item, as determined by regulation, to the local health department in the jurisdiction where the child resides; **AND**
- 19 (IV) REQUIRE THAT BEFORE A CHILD ENTERS NINTH GRADE, 20 THE CHILD HAS RECEIVED THREE DOSES OF THE HUMAN PAPILLOMAVIRUS 21 VACCINE.
- 22 (4) Any requirement for the administration of pertussis vaccine shall be 23 consistent with § 18–332(b) of the Health General Article.
- 24 (b) (1) Unless the Secretary of Health and Mental Hygiene declares an emergency or an epidemic of disease, a child whose parent or guardian objects to immunization on the ground that it conflicts with the parent's or guardian's bona fide religious beliefs and practices may not be required to present a physician's certification of immunization in order to be admitted to school.
- 29 (2) The Secretary of Health and Mental Hygiene shall adopt rules and regulations for religious exemptions under this subsection.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2016.
